

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Tataraakina Hunting Trip



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Stewart Island Trip April / May 2011

On the day after the worst flooding in Hawke's Bay since Cyclone Bola a team of eight were heading to Stewart Island. The Montapertos had headed off in a ute carrying most of the gear including our 2 outboards while the rest flew to Invercargill, grabbed a taxi van, headed for the grocery store, the bottle store then on to Bluff Backpackers where we stayed the night with our host Lex an ex Hawke's Bay man and keen hunter.



A superb breakfast of bacon eggs and toast and a 150m walk across to our boat, a large twin hull cat driven by a young skipper Tai who gave us a lot of valuable information on the way. The boat from Auroara Charters was well set up with a Palfinger crane, large bins for gear and a couple of dingys on the roof that we had hired. I would recommend it to anyone. We had a good crossing of about 4 hours and finally arrived at the North Pegasus Hut, loaded the gear into the dingys, fired up the out boards and headed to our home for 8 days. The previous party which I had previously communicated with and shared some of the boat costs with was there and helped us unload and we helped them move out.

I had come for some peace and quiet, scenery, fishing and oh yeah, hunting. The first evening we had all got into the dingys and went fishing for cod and trumpeter and dropped the cray pot in. We got a good feed and also an introduction to a 7 ft seven gill shark, which was pretty docile really. It didn't take long to figure out who the chefs in the group were and Steve Shaw and Leigh and Paul Montaperto did some excellent cooking while the rest cleaned up afterwards. My nephew Andrew on his first proper hunting trip headed out with the experienced hunters the next day in the dingys to the far side of our large block and came back with all sorts of shiny rocks but no deer. I forgot he had a degree in geology which he used to tell us a lot of interesting stuff about the area. I stayed behind for the peace and quiet bit and did some study for my flying exams plus some more fishing. We discovered a couple of resident sea lions and also a wild cat plus the guys had started seeing and photographing kiwis. Later I got to see a kiwi myself. The deer were a bit scarce and the ones seen were quick movers and disappeared real quick. Steve eventually managed to bag one while sitting down and watching and waiting. He actually had



it walk up to him while he was blowing his nose! Peter Montaperto shot at one but lost it and found no blood trail. 9 deer were seen overall. It is very easy to get disorientated on Stewart Island and a good GPS and compass is a must especially in the leatherwood. Mine wasn't doing too well where the new Garmins were great. I wondered how accurate the compasses were as there is a lot of tin in the ground. There were a lot of

homemade trails down there too and a lot went around in circles near the camp. The weather was overcast and cloudy most days with it turning rough in the latter days of the trip. Rex Bullock, myself and nephew had headed South and called into South Pegasus on one trip while the others headed North. The weather turned rough and they ended up coming overland back to the hut. We managed to retrieve the boat on the last day in a break in the weather with 4 guys in my dingy and 4hp motor hard out. It sounded like a Harvard but never missed a beat the whole trip. I had hired a mountain radio for the trip which was absolutely necessary. We realised that we were way short on fuel for the outboards and through the phone patch we phoned Mana Charters who Peter Thompson new was coming past the next day to South Pegasus. They thankfully dropped off enough fuel for the rest of our stay. We also had PRS Handhelds between us and Steve's Rixon radios were really good. In Summary it was a good trip, it is a must do and we did it pretty well right. It cost \$1400 each for 8 people, we had a small carton of food left over for emergency, the boat was good, the people were great, we had a lot of laughs. We didn't get any shell fish or Crays and a South Pegasus diver said there are a lot of Seven Gills down there. The scenery and wildlife down there is fantastic. I was told there are better hunting blocks which there probably are but I would be happy to go back to this one again at a later date.
